#### **RESEARCH ACTIVITIES**

<u>The Roommate Relationship Study</u> (2012-present)– Cross-sectional sample of first-year undergraduate students were recruited to examine links between parental relationships, roommate relationships, friendships, and multiple dimensions of college adjustment, including anxiety, depression, academic adjustment, and problematic drinking behavior. Study recruited first-year students in pairs, with their roommates, and participants completed surveys about themselves and about their roommates, provide a rich set of dyadic data. Data collection also included a narrative assessment measure of adult attachment secure-base scripts. Study is ongoing and has been supported by funding from the FDRC.

<u>Parental Attachment Bonds and College Student Development and Adjustment: A Meta-Analysis</u> (2008-2011)– Reviewed 150 studies that have been examined links between attachment to parents and multiple dimensions of college adjustment. Manuscript based on these analyses published in the *Journal of Counseling Psychology*.

<u>The Transition To Towson Study (2005-2011)</u>: Longitudinal, experimental study examining adjustment of emerging adults during significant life transition. Included an experimental component in which half the sample was given a 10-week social support group during their first semester in college. Sample followed for 4 years. Results presented at the Society for Research in Child Development, Society for Research on Adolescence, and the American Psychological Association. Two manuscripts have been published, one in the *Journal of College Student Development* and one in the *Journal of College Counseling*.

<u>The College Student Adjustment Study (2000-2002)</u>: A cross-sectional sample of 400 undergraduate students was recruited to participate in an in-depth study of their college adjustment. Participants completed an extensive battery of questionnaires and participated in a Thematic Apperception Test in order to assess their representations of relationships. Results have been presented at the Society for Research in Child Development, Society for Research on Adolescence, and the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies. One manuscript published in the prestigious APA journal, the *Journal of Counseling Psychology*.
